## Things Are Not Always as They Seem

James 1:26-27

Introduction: Dealing with things that are not as they seem can be frustrating. For example, James tells us that a Christian with an uncontrolled tongue is wasting his time trying to please God (Jas. 1:26). Yet, we would like to think the Lord won't care if I use certain euphemisms from time to time. Likewise, real religious conduct is observed by those Christians who care for widows and orphans (Jas. 1:27). Yet, how many Christians care for people who can't help themselves?

- I. Eve was the first one to learn that things are not as they seem.
- A. The tree of knowledge was beautiful, and it could make a person wise; therefore, Eve thought eating its fruit would be a good thing (Gen. 3:6).
- B. Yet, what it brought was a life of hardship and pain in childbearing (Gen. 3:16-19).
- II. Solomon points out that many things in life are vain.
  - A. More wisdom means more sorrows (Eccl. 1:17-18).
- 1. Yet, it brings happiness, peace and contentment. It increases wealth and length of life and is worth more than great wealth (<u>Prov. 3:13-18</u>).
- 2. Incidentally, God gives wisdom generously to those who ask (Jas. 1:5).
  - B. Work (Eccl. 2:17-19; 3:9).
  - C. Wealth (Eccl. 5:10-11)
- III. Wisdom of this world is foolishness (1 Cor. 1:18-25).
  - A. Eternal Salvation can only be achieved through God's word!
- B. Worldly wisdom teaches that religion is a waste of time or even detrimental to real education.
- IV. Developing patience means going through trials (<u>Jas. 1:2-3</u>).
- V. Food doesn't sustain life (<u>John 6:26-27</u>).
- A. Food perishes; one meal does not satisfy all of a body's nutritional needs for a day much less a week. We must constantly feed ourselves or we will die.
  - B. Christ provides food that will last for eternity (John 6:35, 47-51).
- C. Christ's sacrifice on the cross, our obedience and reverence to Him, and feeding from the word of God is what sustains eternal life (<u>John 6:53-58, 63</u>).

Conclusion: One last thing that is not as it seems. The act of baptism saves us from our sins (1 Pet. 3:21; Acts 22:16). To the world it seems like a ritual that has no purpose. Yet, it is actually the response of a good conscience toward God in obedience to his commands (Mk. 16:16). Things are not always as they seem and if you want to be saved from your sins, arrangements for your baptism can be made.
